Farewell Singapore School for the Deaf (SSD)!

Singapore School for the Deaf was officially deregistered on 31 December 2017. To commemorate the school for all it has done for our community, an official closing ceremony was planned 24 March 2018. A organising committee consisting of SSD alumni was set up to plan and implement this programme. The committee had only two months to plan the event but what a great job they did!

Over 400 alumni, ex-SSD principals, teachers, staff and invited guests attended the event, which began at 10:00 am and ended at 6:00 pm. It was more of a homecoming for the many alumni who attended, meeting their old friends and their ex-teachers. Many enjoyed reminiscing their days at SSD from the many photos exhibited around the school compound and a "museum" which was specially set up in one of the classrooms of the school.

It was an enjoyable day for all with many freebies and activities. The most treasured of freebies had to be the magnetic replicas of the five badges of SSD that were worn by students from 1963 to 2017. Participants also enjoyed free ice-cream, kachang puteh, cotton candy, and a sumptuous high-tea buffet.

To officially mark the closing of the school, a ceremony was held at the school hall, with the SADeaf President, Mr Martin Marini, as the Guest-of-Honour. The ex-principals, teachers, and staff were honoured during the ceremony with appreciation awards. Mr Peng Tsu Ying, who pioneered the use of Sign Language in the education of the Deaf in Singapore and inspired generations of Deaf students in his 35 years as an educator of the Deaf,







was conferred the Honorary Membership of the Singapore Association for the Deaf. There were also speeches by ex-students, principals and teachers and a special performance by the ex-members of HI Theatre, which brought laughter to the audience.

To end the ceremony, the Guest-of-Honour rang the school bell for the very last time. Although it was sad to bid farewell to the Singapore School for the Deaf, we believe that its legacy will continue to thrive and inspire for many years to come. One example is the integrated programme at Mayflower Primary School, which was developed in close collaboration between MOE and the teachers of SSD.

A Day in the Life of ...



Today the spotlight shines on **Michael Lim Lee Seng**, an Instructor at Mountbatten Vocational School (MVS). Michael joined MVS way back in 1981 and today, at 58, he is as youthful and energetic as when he first started training Deaf and Hardof-Hearing trainees at the school. He was the first Hard-of-hearing instructor to teach at MVS. When asked how he could maintain his youthful and healthy look, he stated that he always try to maintain a positive outlook in life and be cheerful all the time. He also keeps himself trim from his daily cycling between his home in Toa Payoh and work during school days.

Q: How did you come to know of MVS or work for the school?

It was my mother who introduced me to the Vocational School for the Handicapped (VSH), which was the old name for MVS. After my studies at the Vocational and Industrial Training Board, which later became the Institute of Technical Education (ITE) at the age of 17, my mom felt that I was still too young to work, so she sent me to VSH to continue my studies. It was at VSH that I came to know other Deaf students like me and I learned Sign Language from them.

> After completing my training in VSH, the Administrator of the school at that time, offered me a job at the school as an assistant to the instructors. When I started working at the school, I was just 20 years old. After four months working as an assistant instructor, I was asked to take over the position of another instructor who left. I have been with the school since then.

Q: What does your job involve?

I will be in school by 7:30 am usually. The main subjects I teach are Computer Application and Office Skills but I help out in the kitchen and restaurant as well when we have in-house training for the students. For CCA, I partner another instructor to take charge of the soccer activity for our students. During my free periods, I will prepare my lessons, mark assignments or prepare the computer lab for the next class.

> And with my colleagues in school, we will be involved in the planning and organisation of official events in school, such as the graduation ceremony, year-end prizegiving, sports day, National Day celebration, outings, etc.

Q: Do you find your work fulfilling and meaningful?

I truly admire my teachers when I was a student at MVS. They were very helpful and encouraging. They were the reasons why I decided to be in education. I want to share the knowledge, skills and values that they have imparted to me with my students. I always feel happy and satisfied to see my students improving in their studies and do well in their training and work after they have graduated.

Q: Your hero?

My teacher at MVS, Mr Goh, who was very helpful to me. He was always encouraging me to do better not only in my studies but in my life as well. He was my mentor when I was a student and when I started work at the school. He is retired now but we are still in contact.



Q: What do you like to do during your free time?

I like spending time with my family, especially my three daughters, who are 18, 17 and 14. The two elder ones are now in Polytechnics and the last one is in Secondary 2. They grew up so fast and soon they will be working and have their own life. Before they leave the nest, I want to spend as much time as I can with them.

Q: Your dream?

My dream is to see all my daughters do well and be happy in their life. And also, I would like to travel a bit when I retire.





46th National Inclusive Athletics Championships 2018

Storytelling in Singapore Sign Language (SgSL) at Public Libraries

This time, the sign language storytelling sessions were held at 5 public libraries across Singapore – Jurong West, Yishun, Toa Payoh, Sengkang and Bedok from 12 to 16 March 2018.

Many Deaf and hearing children and their family members participated in the storytelling session. The tales shared for this round were The Three Little Pigs and The Ugly Duckling. Stories for previous rounds were The Boy Who Cried Wolf and Hansel and Gretel.

For every story, a Deaf storyteller narrated the story in Singapore Sign Language and this was translated into English by a Sign Language Interpreter. Along with that,

we have facilitators to manage powerpoint slides for the learning of sign language vocabulary and to assist with the role play.

Our team also prepared fun and adorable props relating to the two stories. So after learning spoken and sign vocabulary relating to the stories of the day, and listening to the stories, members of the public were invited to role play in the stories. For The Three Little Pigs, there were the 3 different houses – made of hay, wood, brick, and even a pot of boiling water!



From the look of the participants' faces, they really were excited to be part of the session and demonstrated learning of the sign language vocabulary. Some children showed their creativeness (and cheekiness!) during the role play. At the end of the session, all participants and young actors

> received Merdeaf badges to applaud their efforts in participating, and progress in learning and using sign language.

Goat Farm Visit

Igniters organised a visit to Hay Dairies for members of our deaf community on Saturday, 28 April 2018.

Upon reaching Hay Dairies, the participants are warmly welcomed by the staff there. The staff then orientated the participants around the goat farm and introduced them to the goat milking station. There were many goats lining up, ready to be milked by the farmers at this station. All of the participants were amazed by how much milk a goat can produce in a day.

Together with an interpreter, the staff began his sharing about the history of Hay Dairies and their goats. He further explained that all the goats in Hay Dairies are from Australia and are meant for domestic milking only. He also went on to explain the health benefits of goat milk compared to cow milk. Before he ended his sharing, he distributed several packets of Alfafa hay to the participants which can be used to be fed to the goats later.

For many of the participants, it was their first time interacting with the goats. Many got the chance to feed the goat and managed to touch them. The goats there were also very friendly and they enjoyed the treats of hay given by the participants during their free and easy tour around the goat farm.

After the free and easy session, the participants were treated to a bottle of delicious cold chocolate goat milk. All of them also received a tote bag.



Overall, this goat farm tour had truly been meaningful and enriching trip for many of the participants who were experiencing it for the very first time.
